62-year-old woman is currently on federal parole following a six-year prison term for distributing cocaine, marijuana, and other drugs in the Malden-Melrose area during the early 1980s, according to Middlesex Assistant District Attorney William Bloomer.

Bloomer requested bail of \$250,000. But Judge Paul Cavanaugh set bail at \$500,000 "because of the seriousness of the allegations." A pretrial conference is scheduled for April 27.

The arrest followed a seven-month investigation by Melrose and Saugus detectives, the Boston Drug Task Force and the federal Drug Enforcement Administration. The investigation will continue, based largely on apparent drug transaction records found at the

# Police hold suspect in fatal bombing

The man authorities suspect built the bomb that killed one Boston police officer and injured another last year in Roslindale was arrested yesterday by Boston police and federal agents on unrelated Rhode Island charges.

Also yesterday, law enforcement sources said the bomb that killed Officer Jeremiah J. Hurley and injured his bomb squad partner, Francis S. Foley, was designed to be remotely detonated and used at least two sticks of dynamite as the explosive.

Sources said the bomb exploded for one of three reasons: Either someone deliberately triggered the device, or Hurley and Foley inadvertently detonated it, or random radio or microwave transmissions set it off.

The sources said specialists believe it was highly unlikely that the bomb was detonated by radio or microwaves.

Sources said the 36-year-old Milton man is suspected by state and federal investigators of building the device that detonated in the rear of an Eastbourne Street home on Oct. 28. The bomb had been attached to the car of Thomas L. Shay, who lives at that address with his fiancée, Mary A. Flanagan.

The Milton man "was made a suspect early on," said a law enforcement source. "He's an electrical engineer with a degree from Wentworth; he's capable of building a bomb, having done that in the past; and he's a known acquaintance of the

son" of Shay.

The source was referring to Thomas A. Shay, 20. On March 27, the younger Shay issued a press release in which he said he had been told by investigators that the Milton man was suspected of building the bomb. Shay described the man as a friend and confirmed his name was listed in Shay's address book.

The source added that the Milton man "knows he's a suspect, his attorney knows he's a suspect, and his family knows he's a suspect." According to sources, the man was arrested in 1986 by Quincy police and accused of building a bomb that was attached with magnets from a stereo speaker to the bottom of a fish company truck. The case was ultimately dismissed, but the circumstances of the dismissal were not clear last night.

That bomb was also designed to be remotely detonated, but it apparently was discovered before it could be exploded.

According to sources, the Quincy bomb had strong similarities to the device that killed Hurley. Both were attached to the bottom of a vehicle by stereo-speaker magnets, both were painted black and both were designed to be remotely detonated.

Sources said that the Milton man's name and telephone pager number appeared in the younger Shay's address book, which investigators obtained from Shay's father after the bombing.

Hurley's death is being investigated by Boston police, the US Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms, US Attorney John Pappalardo's office and the office of Suffolk District Attorney Newman Flanagan. Spokesmen for the prosecutors and the federal bureau could not be reached yesterday.

A federal grand jury is investigating the case and has held several sessions, but no charges have been issued. Boston police detectives and agents of the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms have inter-

Boston police said the Milton man was arrested by homicide detectives and federal agents at about 4:30 p.m. yesterday on Boylston Street in downtown Boston.

He was arrested on a Rhode Island warrant issued last Nov. 4 charging him with passing fraudulent checks of more than \$1,000 in value. He was held last night at the Area D4 police lockup and was expected to remain in custody over the weekend.

The younger Shay, meanwhile, was in Boston Municipal Court yesterday, where his attorney tried to get him sent to Bridgewater State Hospital for a mental competency evaluation.

William C. McPhee also said his client, Thomas A. Shay, has been found to have a history of "slight mental retardation." McPhee further said Shay has an extra Y chromosome, one more than normal.

The younger Shay has been charged with telephoning in a fake

bomb threat to the Back Bay station in 1990 and with being a common nightwalker.

A probable cause hearing was scheduled for yesterday but was postponed by Judge Anthony Sullivan until at least April 27, while the issue of Shay's competency is resolved. Sullivan scheduled a competency hearing for Wednesday.

McPhee said Shay has ignored his orders not to speak with reporters or investigators regarding the homicide case and apparently lacks an understanding of the serious legal problems he faces.

Shay, who is being held on bail in the Nashua Street Jail, said yesterday he telephoned assistant US Attorney Paul Kelly earlier this week. Kelly is overseeing the federal grand jury investigating the explosion.

In arguing that Shay should be considered incompetent, McPhee noted that his client has a 13-year history of psychological difficulties and that he has spent most of his adult life in some form of institutional care.
